## **ORDINANCE 29**

Missing file and thorough search were completed.

See attached page 3 from June 11, 1959 Council Meeting.
Ordinance 29 was approved.

Ordinance No. 27 was read by City Attorney Riach who commented that it was substantially the same as the Snohomish County Ordinance. A suggestion was made by Mayor pro-tempore Forsgren that a limit should be placed on the number of machines that could be placed under one Owner's License. After a general discussion it was decided that the fee for the Coin Machine Owner's License should be changed to read \$1500.00 for one year instead of \$1200.00 with a limit of 20 machines per license.

A motion was made by Councilman Moore that Ordinance No. 27 be adopted with a \$1500.00 license fee per year for the privilege of placing 20 machines. The motion was seconded by Councilman Chadwick and carried unanimously.

ORDINANCE NO. 28 - An ordinance providing for the licensing, keeping, harboring and treatment of dogs within the City of Lynnwood, providing for impounding and disposal of dogs, and providing penalties for violation of its provisions.

Ordinance No. 28 was read by City Attorney Riach. Attorney Riach stated

that it was much the same as the Snohomish County Ordinance pertaining to licensing of dogs. A motion was made by Councilman Moore to adopt the ordinance as read. The motion was seconded by Councilman Guth and carried unanimously.

ORDINANCE NO. 29 - An ordinance regulating and controlling peddlers and salesmen, providing for licenses, defining offenses and prescribing penalties for the violation thereof.

Ordinance No. 29 was read by City Attorney Riach and a motion was made by Councilman Buxton and seconded by Councilman Guth to adopt the ordinance as read. The motion carried with a vote of 3 to 1, Councilman Moore voting against its adoption.

A proposed ordinance to provide for licensing of business within the City was discussed but was not ready for final consideration.

A short discussion was held as to the advisability of adopting a nuisance ordinance as a catch-all measure.

Mayor pro-tempore Forsgren announced there would be an executive meeting of the council the following Thursday, June 18, 1959, which candidates for City Supervisor would be asked to attend.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Councilman Moore. The motion was seconded by Councilman Guth and carried unanimously.
